MISSION

The DoJR project will build a first ever master catalog, JCat, of all record collections holding Jewish genealogically relevant data. For those seeking to discover their ancestors, JCat will answer the question "What records are available for my ancestral town?"

VISION

Every Jewish descendant can connect their ancestors from generation to generation, I'dor v'dor, across the time of recorded history and strengthen Jewish identity through ancestral discovery. Every Jewish descendant can discover, connect, and belong.

DoJR research in the archives, libraries, and museums onsite and online will accelerate digitization, records indexing projects, and records preservation. Information published in JCat will reduce redundant surveys and duplicate projects. The initial DoJR priority will be to identify record collections currently unknown to the genealogical community - breaking through brick walls in connecting the generations.

Key components of the DoJR project:


- CONTENT ACQUISITION through regional custodial organizations survey and content acquired via onsite and online survey projects, extant catalog extensions, API (Application Programming Interface) development, and published post extractions
- PLATFORM DEVELOPMENT for catalog entry and search with UI/UX (User Interface/User Experience) design in native languages
- AUTOMATION DEVELOPMENT including pilot project(s) and AI/ML (Artificial Intelligence/Machine Language) frameworks

JCat will comprise record collections from all countries and in all forms (paper, microfilm, online, photos, audio, video, etc.).

ABOUT IAJGS The International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS) delivers the "World of Jewish Ancestry Where You Live" through its global network of 94 societies. The IAJGS was formed in 1988 to provide a common voice for issues of significance to its members, to advance family history research, and to produce the annual International Conference on Jewish Genealogy.




WHERE WE'RE GOING

Most of the information about our Jewish ancestors' past is hidden in plain sight and we don't even know about it. This information tells us what life was like for our ancestors, who they were, what they did, and how they lived. It connects one generation to the next, helps us know who we are, and allows us to leave that knowledge as a legacy for our children, their children, and their children's children, so that they also can know who they are.

You start this discovery with a catalog of everything - not just the birth, marriage, and death records researchers first think of, not just the records labeled "Jewish", but the less obvious often information richer records. A treasure trove of records of our ancestors' lives resides in archives, libraries, courthouses, synagogues and many other facilities in shtetls and cities across the globe. JCat is a global reference for all these records that document individuals, inform their life stories, and enable the building of family and community histories, preserving Jewish history and heritage.

DOJR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

IDEATION & PROJECT PLAN

Need and implementation feasibility reviewed by diverse stakeholders: researchers, archivists, librarians, genealogist leaders and luminaries, and genealogy company executives.

KEY STAFF & ADVISORS

Core team with essential leadership, management, and data and catalog technology skills in place. Subject matter experts advising on content acquisition strategies, record type taxonomies, authority files and standards.

PROOF OF CONCEPT

Pilot project successfully completed: identified substantial number of hidden-in-plain-sight record collections and validated the catalog entry template.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Constituent Resource Management (CRM) system operational.

USE CASE FEEDBACK

Feedback obtained from diverse user personas and requirements refined.

DESIGN

Conceptual data model definition underway.





THE ROAD TO DISCOVERY

"Each JCat entry, from across the globe, is a building block in the preservation of Jewish history and our collective heritage."



JCat will be populated with information about record collections from a myriad of sources:

CROWDSOURCE

Individual researchers: professional and hobbyist

CATALOGS & PROJECTS

Custodial entities holding records and catalogs of records

REGIONAL NETWORKS

Jewish genealogical societies and regional affiliates

PUBLICATIONS & POSTINGS

Print media and social media current and archived

In parallel, research will begin in automated catalog culling and catalog entry creation.

Automation will speed up the addition of new information to the catalog at a lower cost per catalog entry.





TECHNOLOGY MAKES IT ACHIEVABLE

- DIGITIZATION: Institutions continue to digitize their collections facilitating online access
- CROWDSOURCING: Crowdsourcing methods enable a global community of catalog contributors
- AUTOMATION: Advances in use of Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning for records processing drive down catalog entry cost and time

WHY NOW

Because now we can... before it is too late

WHILE DOORS ARE OPEN

 OPEN ACCESS: Fluctuations and variances in administrations and policies of archival institutions drive a mandate to get inside now, before the door closes again.

TIME IS THE ENEMY

 RECORDS VULNERABILITY: Records suffer damage and destruction with time (human, mold, insect, flood and fire)



BY THE NUMBERS

52

DISCOVERY

- 52 collections discovered which were previously unknown by 2 archival researchers (Mikolayev, Ukraine and Kielce, Poland) in 4 weeks
- 80 more hidden-in-plain-sight expected in Mikolayev

CATALOGS

- 1,893,000 collections in FamilySearch catalog
- 8,500 collections keyword search "Jewish" in FamilySearch catalog
- 85,400 libraries/archives (123 countries) in WorldCat/OCLC
- 60M pages of documentation Central Archives for the History of the Jewish People

IMPACT

- 116k Jewish individuals discovered in 4 week Pilot Project
- 580,000 descendants now have a new record of their ancestor (assuming each with 5 living descendants)
- 30 researchers in a year = 9,000 discovered collections
- 1.8M are actively tracing Jewish ancestry,
 3.5M want to know, 8.1M want to know if it is easy to discover

99.9%

AUTOMATION

- 99.9% decrease in time when Al used for indexing 5M records in 10 hours vs.
 150 human years
- DoJR pilot project costs \$85 per catalog entry with potential to realize order of magnitude savings
