




# Challenges


- The Southern United States was primarily agrarian for the last 200 years.
- Many settlers were farmers who were illiterate and lived away from cities or churches that recorded vital records.
- It could require a day or more to travel to a county courthouse, or even a church, so many events, particularly birth and deaths, were never recorded. Unless you were in a large city you will likely not see birth or death records until about 1900.
- It is all about the land. Detailed deeds, property, tax and court records were kept to document land ownership.

Statewide registration of births and death began in 1919. General compliance for births by 1928 and deaths by 1922.


### Record Loss

1828 The courthouse at Irwinton burned on 16 March. All of the county courthouse records were lost.<sup>[5]</sup>

1854 The courthouse burned down on 7 February and all county records were destroyed.<sup>[5]</sup>

## **Fan Club**



### Genealogy Tip:

Get to know your ancestor's fan club. FAN stands for Friends, Associates, and Neighbors. Make a list of the people you see interacting with your ancestor and seek out their records. Sometimes they can even be used to help identify your ancestors or discover new information.

# **Military Records**

- The Revolutionary, War of 1812 and Civil War produced records that are vital for us learning more about our ancestors.
- The south was greatly impacted by these wars, especially the Civil War.
- Assume that at least one member of the family may have joined in the war effort. Many bordering states between the north and the south had both Union and Confederate troops
- If your male ancestor was about 18 years or older at the onset of the Civil war check for their service

- Joel Franklin died on 7 February 1895 in Pettis County, Missouri.



Company D - Captain Henry H. Knowlton, Captain William J. McKee - Louisiana, Pike County, Missouri




