Determine the actual name of your ancestor

Czech alphabet and alphabetization

Surname Spellings

Ancestor's surname altered to fit the spelling and grammar of the language used in the parish register:

Čermák → Tschermak

Šebek → Schebek

Havlíček → Hawlitzek

Schultz → Šulc

Schreier → Šrajer

Schmidt → Šmid

Surname Gender Variations

Petr Novák and Františka Nováková

Jan Mikulecký and Anežka Mikulecká

Jan Sýkora and Kateřina Sýkorová

Pavel Mrázek and Jana Mrázková

Inflection

The Czech language is highly inflective – words have different endings depending on usage:

Josef, syn Antonína Ryby a Anny roz. Novákové

→ Josef, son of Antonín Ryba and Anna Nováková

Manželství mezi Michalem Dostálkem a Anežkou Marií Seidlerovou

→ Marriage between Michal Dostálík and Anežka Marie Seidlerová

Determine the Place of Origin

Borders, empires and countries changed, but the cities, towns, and villages did not:

- 1526 – 1918 Hapsburg Rule
- 1918 – 1938 Czechoslovakia
- 1993 – Present Czech Republic

Czech Family History Records are Local Records

Even if you find what looks like your ancestor in an indexed record, assure that firm evidence beyond having the same name verifies that it is the same person – most names were common. A place of origin (city, town, village) named in a verifiable U.S. record is almost a necessity.

Gazetteers

- A **Gazetteer**, a geographical dictionary, tool for identifying places
- Start with the sources created in the country of immigration
- Place names are misspelled in American sources
- Exact town of origin must be known before research in Czech records can begin

- Various regional gazetteers available at the Family History Library.

Gazetteer Hints:

- Many locality names are comprised of two or more words:
Česká Lípa – look under Česká and also under Lípa.
- Different names in different languages: Karlové Vary → Karlsbad.
- Diacritic marks omitted: Štěpánov → Stepanov.
- Many localities have similar names that may be easily confused:
Kámen, Kamenec, Kamenica, Kamenice, Kamenička, Kamenický, Kamenka, Kamenná, Kamenné, Kamenný, Kamienka
- Over 100 places in the Czech Republic called Nová Ves!

Determine the Record Keeping Jurisdiction

Online Gazetteer “GenTeam.at”

- Register (free), log in, and select “Gazetteer” at left, search for city, town, or village.
- On finding the place name, select the “Details” icon.
- Details page includes former names, **(1) present location name; (2) parish**; start dates for births, marriages and deaths records; former parish; judicial district; crown land; and **(3) a link to the archive’s Internet page**.

How to Locate Family Records

Archive Web Sites

- English instructions the main Czech archive websites are linked from the FamilySearch Wiki “Czech Republic Online Genealogy Records” page:

Look in the section “Available through Czech Archives” for links to the instructions.
- All archives **except Zámrska** work in a similar fashion:
 1. A path is provided for finding parish register inventories alphabetically or by search
 2. Images are available online one-by-one
- *Zámrska is different:*
 1. Download a single PDF of the inventory
 2. Find your parish in the inventory
 3. Follow hot links in the PDF inventory to download entire church books (long download times)

| Jewish (all regions and localities) | http://www.badatelna.eu/fond/1073 Select “Rejstříky” and then find Jewish community alphabetically. |
